Peterloo was originally composed in a shorter version, in 1978, while the composer was Composer in Schools for two years, at Auckland's North Shore Teacher's College. It was written for and performed by the College music department under the direction of Stuart Manins.

The handwritten manuscript remained untouched until 2006 when the composer loaded it on to a computer, revisited it again in 2017, revised and lengthened it to its present form.
